## **Department of Education's Proposed Rule**

The US Department of Education first published the rule in May 2023, which proposed removing duplicative billing consent requirements for students with an IEP, streamlining billing permissions for students enrolled in Medicaid. Earlier this month, the Department of Education withdrew the notice of proposed rulemaking.

The withdrawal of the proposed rule means that the status quo continues. The current billing consent requirements will remain the same for both IEP students and non-IEP students. *To read more, click here.*

EVERETT, Wash., Oct. 16, 2024 (CLOBE NEWSWIRE) -- As students returned to Options High 5-Roo for the 2024-25 school year, they found an exicting new addition to their campus the initial phases a school-based health clinic, specifically designed to support their mental wellness -- the first of its kind for Bellingham Public Schools.
